11th annual Red Oak Grove Reunion will be celebrated May 21

Red Oak Grove Presbyterian Church was founded March 1, 1841, but the congregation did not have a church building until 1859. The present building was dedicated May 8, 1921. It is on the National Register of Historic Places, as is the cemetery.

Updates: gutter-downspout project, cemetery monument preservation

The projected replacement of gutters and downspouts for Red Oak Grove Church has now been fully funded by friends of Red Oak Grove Church and Cemetery. Bids are now being sought for the job, according to Bob Rickard, Cemetery Association president. Work should be completed during the summer.

Cemetery assistant sexton Eric Storjohann in April 2017 reset the monuments of Alexander Cumins (1799-1859) and John Scroggie (1829-1899). Daisy Wingert, a member of the Cemetery Association Board, has made application to replace the monument of Isaac Carl (1753-1847). A veteran of the War of 1812, he was born in Cayuga County, N. Y.; lived in Ohio; and moved to Red Oak Grove in 1839.

ANOTHER RED OAK GROVE Church and Cemetery are located in Udolpho Township, Mower County Minn. (north of Austin, south of Blooming Prairie). Red Oak Grove Lutheran Church was founded in 1859. The earliest legible gravestone has an 1866 date.

Red Oak Grove Church and Cemetery have been listed on The National Register of Historic Places since February 3, 2010.

- Clean and reforest the timbered area west of the church to accommodate a labyrinth, walking paths along Rock Creek, and paths linking the cemetery and Red Oak Park.
