Having learned two days ago that work would soon be completed in the newly created groom's room at Red Oak Church, it was now or never. We decided after waiting decades it was time to break through the 6" thick wall to recover our concealed bounty, hidden for oh so long! The breach was made...

Oh my, have you heard of the empty tomb? It has been many years but I will try to recollect what I remember. Since the new Red Oak Church was built where the old church once stood, many remains had been left after the fire and everything was just built over them. Where the entrance to the old church had been was now covered with the new entrance which was all poured in concrete. Now there was no way for Jesus to leave or enter. God has always been in the Red Oak Church and the picture of Jesus knocking on the door which is still in the church and shows just that. He wants to leave the tomb. Red Oak Church has been home to God always. In the future, Red Oak will never close and God will see that happen. God is always in charge. This may explain the hole in the wall.

Virginia added this note to her reply: When I started this, I thought I could have a good imagination but the knowledge of attending Red Oak took over so I just decided to continue and let my love for Red Oak take over. I attended church around the age of 10 years

and left Iowa when I turned 18. I am now 86. I know that God could be where he wanted but this is now 2023 so fiction prevails.

Here is Barb's creative ending: This story may put your mind to rest about the recently discovered hole in the wall of in the Red Oak Grove Church basement. Early settlers to Cedar County might have talked about Wee People in and around Rock Creek. I have a story about them in real time - like the present, 2023. It is said Wee People came with the first settlers to the Rock Creek area. Perhaps they crawled in the trunks of those settlers before they came across the ocean from Scotland. They hid among the precious belongings of those Scottish immigrants bound for a better life in the New World. They journeyed to Iowa in a wagon, jostling around as they made their way up and down hills, across rivers and through a sparsely populated countryside.

When they arrived in Cedar County near Rock Creek, the Wee People quickly made their way to the woods, hiding among the roots and crevices of the Red Oak trees. The trees provided adequate room but in winter, they craved better shelter. When the first wood frame church was built, they found a safe place to live. Then, early in the 20th century, plans were being made by Presbyterians to build a larger church to serve a fast-growing community called Shiloh. And what a lovely building they built. The Wee People could hardly wait to move into the new church and wondered where they could settle, a place where they would be safe and warm. After touring the building in January of 1921, they decided under the steps leading to the basement from the front door would be an out-of-theway place for them to call home. There was a small broken area of wall in the storage area which would be their doorway.

In the spring of 2022, there was a lot of noise in the church basement. They had watched the year before when the kitchen area was redone but that was far from their private living area. This latest remodel was done right close to their home under the stairs and they worried how they could come and go if they closed off the entrance of their home. But their fears were put to rest when the carpenters left the small doorway intact and framed it nicely so they can come and go without getting in the way of jagged edges of the old opening. The newly remodeled basement in Red Oak Grove Church has turned out to be such a wonderful space not only for the Big People who use the church but for the Wee People who live there.
